

As you have seen, if you have attended services in the last two weeks, kitchen renovations are well underway! Kitchen work is slated to be completed during the month of June. Then it is on to the sanctuary renovations, which include removing the ductwork from the attic space, framing an archway between the foyer and worship space, installing new lighting and the necessary electrical work, building soffits along three sides of the room, and drywalling the entire sanctuary ceilings and any other areas affected by the new framing

While services will continue at our Cooley Road church during kitchen work, construction in the sanctuary will require us to relocate during the summer. We are grateful to the First Congregational Church of Canandaigua for making their chapel available to us to rent for our Sunday worship starting June 25th at 10:00. This is the stone chapel on the grounds of the Congregational Church at 58 North Main Street, just north of downtown Canandaigua.

Parking on Sunday morning is available in the upper and lower parking lots behind the church, and the lawyers' office lots on either side of the church, in addition to the parking on Main Street. We also have permission from Johnson-Kennedy Funeral Home across Main St. to park in their lot on Sunday mornings. There are several churches centered in this part of Main Street, so parking places may be in demand. There is a drop off zone in front of the church and a lift for those with mobility issues.

After much board discussion, hours of committee research and planning, extensive consultations with contractors, and pre-construction preparations, it is exciting to see our visions beginning to take form! Thanks to so many people who stepped forward to take a role in upgrading our church into a more functional and welcoming home.

Brought to us by Danielle Lyon, this motion is to help UUCC become more widely known in its efforts on behalf of the migrant community, especially the farm and dairy workers with whom we are already engaged in education and support activities.
